Director's Note:

Noir, a "genre or aesthetic of crime film or fiction characterized by cynicism, fatalism, and moral ambiguity," is certainly not as popular as it once was. The peak era for the noir cop drama was the 1940's and 1950's. We know that the most popular forms of entertainment tend to give the audience easy answers, and for the most part leans into the most basic ideals of the culture it is entertaining. The reason for this is simple. Any ambiguity can make people feel uncomfortable. This discomfort also arises around any sort of change; societal, personal or otherwise. How interesting then is it to express the social challenges of personal identity and acceptance (social issues which our cast feels very strongly about) through a noir story about a werewolf? The werewolf is an ambiguous mixture, they are the very embodiment of the outsider who inflicts change on us.

The world is full of people and creatures just trying to be themselves. Learning to be comfortable with things we don't understand; full acceptance of that gray space between our polarized ideas of politics, gender, identity, race, and even the space between human and animal...might just be a way forward.

In 1976, Mark Stein became a playwright-in-residence at New Playwrights Theater in Washington, DC. His play Groves of Academe won the 1982 Heideman Award at Actors Theater of Louisville and went on to an off-Broadway production at Manhattan Theatre Club. Subsequent play premieres have included At Long Last Leo (South Coast Repertory, 1988); Ghost Dance (River Stage, 1997); Direct from Death Row the Scottsboro Boys (River Stage, 2000; Joseph Jefferson Award, Raven Theater's Chicago production, 2015) and Mating Dance of the Werewolf (co-produced by Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre and Rubicon Theater, 2005).

Stein also wrote the screenplay for Housesitter (1992), starring Steve Martin and Goldie Hawn, along with an episode of Nero Wolfe (A&E network) and television movies for CBS and NBC.

His book, How the States Got Their Shapes (2008) was a New York Times Best Seller and became the basis for a History Channel series by the same name, hosted by Brian Unger. Stein's poetic and hybrid works have appeared in Moment, Michigan Quarterly, Nimrod, Exposition Review, Eclectica, Burningword Journal and Wraparound South.
