### **Director's Note:**

The original *Night of the Living Dead* film from 1968 holds a truly unique place in film history in that it revolutionized a movie genre and became the springboard for countless zombie stories that came afterward. Featuring the color-blind casting (rare in 1968) of the talented Duane Jones as Ben, and coming only a few months after the world lost Martin Luther King, Jr., the film unwittingly also became an allegory for the disquieting times it was released in.

I think one of the allures of watching horror films is that it gives us a safe space to feel emotions. This play, a "reinvention" of the story made with George Romero's blessing, is fully aware of the frustrations and fear we feel as we deal with some of the same social issues 56 years later. This is not straight horror. Perhaps the playwrights knew that, like poor Barbra, we are all traumatized enough already; and so they offer us a playground: a creative and inventive space to be a little scared, a little silly, and to laugh at our problems. Like the characters presented in our story, we butt heads. We all try again and again to figure things out. In the end though, I think that when there are no clear solutions it is the act of learning to laugh together that we find the real path forward.

## **Crow City Theatre:**

Night of the Living Dead Live is our second production, following last year's Mating Dance of the Werewolf. We aim to bring the dark, the mysterious, and the fantastical side of theater to the Rochester stage. We are deeply grateful for the collaborative spirit and imagination of our members, as well as our audiences who make this community possible.
